Sun Protection Policy



At Little Oaks we understand the need to protect children from the harm that may be caused by prolonged, unprotected exposure to hot sun. Therefore, in order to minimise the risks to the children in our care we aim to ensure the following:

- Parents are requested to apply sun cream before their child comes to Little Oaks. Our expectation will be that this has happened.
- Under most circumstances staff will not apply sun cream therefore preventing the
 possibility of cross contamination for children and staff with allergies. However, if
 children are with us all day, we will provide sun cream which will be applied after lunch.
 This will be a UVA 5* children's sun cream factor 30 which is discarded and replaced
 annually.
- If your child cannot use this for any reason, we will ask the parents to supply a bottle
 for us to use and our Administering Medication policy applies. Sun cream for the all-day
 children will be applied at lunch time when they stay all day. The named sun cream will
 be stored out of reach of children and we will obtain written permission from
 parents/carers to apply.
- Where medical need for an individual child dictates that sun cream needs to be applied more frequently than 3 hourly then parents must obtain a letter from their doctor stating this and we will follow the medical advice.
- Parents will be advised that the best protection for their child is for them to wear loose fitting clothing that fully covers arms and legs and that if they are worried that sun cream will not last until the end of a session this type of dress is essential.
- Parents will be requested to send their child with a sun hat during spells of sunny
 weather. Little Oaks will hold a supply of hats and these may be used instead of their
 own. If our members of staff deem a child to be inadequately dressed and Little Oaks
 is unable to provide spare, suitable clothes then the child in question may be kept
 indoors for their own protection.
- In periods of extreme heat staff may choose to limit the amount of time any child can spend outside either by recording the times individual children access the outside area or, more usually, by limiting the amount of time the outside area is available for the whole group.
- When possible, gazebos or similar will be erected to provide additional protection.
- During periods of extreme heat, drinking water will be provided outside in addition to inside.
- The Setting Managers will take responsibility for deciding what constitutes "extreme heat" (or in their absence the Room Supervisors). Advice will be sought from the relevant bodies as necessary.
